From the Pastor

Who do you say that I am? Jesus asks his disciples that question in our scripture for this coming Sunday, September 12th. They answer him clearly:

"You are the Χριστός, Christos - the Anointed One, the Christ" (Mk. 8:29).

And then Jesus begins to teach them

what this means: that he must be rejected, suffer, die and rise again.



Who are we? This is one of the guiding questions asked by our GLC Transition Team. As Christians, we are followers of the Anointed One, the One who gave his life for the people. How will we continue to follow Jesus through this lingering pandemic and transition time? In the five months I have been with you as interim pastor, I have come to know some of who Gethsemane is, and glimpsed some of who you are becoming...

We are a musical church. In the rise and swell of the Canticle of Praise, you meet God and feel yourself reconnected. The ghosts of the dance hall days still tap their toes in the hallways.

We are a communing church. In the bread and in the cup, you catch your breath and ground yourself again in the body of God.

We are a serving church. You want to be of use to the neighborhood and to the world.

In each of these reflections, there is grief. We mourn the days of choir practices and performances. We mourn receiving the bread and cup in the traditional way. We mourn the benevolence programs we used to pursue. And while we count the days until we can safely sing in choir and receive communion at the rail, this temporary mourning reminds us of deeper losses...staff departures, the closing of our preschool, and more. These big losses are painful and take time to heal.

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"We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies." - 2 Cor 4:8-10

In each of these reflections, there is opportunity. Healing happens slowly and takes great courage and commitment. Following Jesus, the Anointed One, to the cross is a challenging journey. And while I can easily point to small opportunities...the chance to share your favorite hymns, openings for altar guild volunteers, the awesome neighborhood pumpkin patch we are hosting in October...the big opportunity is harder to see. It is the opportunity to be like Christ.

To give your life away, and rise again.

To surrender to loss, and trust God for resurrection.

To pick up the cross. In a world where the cross has been brandished as a weapon, we raise it broken and humble, proclaiming no expertise, making no guarantees, saying only that death is not the end and has no victory. There is hope in being reborn, for we trust a Living God to give us new life.

Beloved, the Holy One holds us in our grief and walks before us into the future. May we trust Jesus every step of the way.




From the Council President

September 3rd, 2021

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ!

Today I share with you a bible verse that I found in a book called Bible Promises for Life. The passage comes to us from Psalm 28:7. I'm sharing this with you because there are many things in our world going on that we can't control ourselves. We have been in this current Covid world since March 13th of 2020. We also see things on the news that add to our list of other situations that we do not like and should not overreact to. We all have compassion for people affected by these situations— Hurricane Ida being the latest one— and we can do things like prayers and donations to make a difference. The most important thing is what David did in reaction of what was going in his times. The verse reads as follows; You are my Strength and my shield from every danger, When I fully trust in you, help is on the way. I jump for joy and burst forth with ecstatic, passionate praise! I will sing songs of what you mean to me!



I found this exposition from a site called biblestudytools.com. Here is David's declaration and confession of faith, coupled with a testimony from his experience.

The Lord is my strength... The Lord employs his power on our behalf, and moreover, infuses strength into us in our weakness. The psalmist, by an act of appropriating faith, takes the omnipotence of Jehovah to be his own. Dependence upon the invisible God gives great independence of spirit, inspiring us with confidence more than human.

...And my shield. Thus, David found both sword and shield in his God. The Lord preserves his people from unnumbered ills; and the Christian warrior, sheltered behind his God, is far more safe than the hero when covered with his shield of brass or triple shield.

My heart trusted in him, and I am helped. Heart work is sure work; heart trust is never disappointed. Faith must come before help, but help will never be long behindhand. Every day the believer may say, "I am helped," for the divine assistance is vouchsafed us every moment, or we should go back unto perdition; when more manifest help is needed, we have but to put our faith into exercise, and it will be given us.

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Therefore, my heart greatly rejoiceth; and with my song I will praise him. The heart is mentioned twice to show the truth of his faith and his joy. Observe the adverb “greatly,” we need not be afraid of being too full of rejoicing at the remembrance of grace received. We serve a great God, let us greatly rejoice in him. A song is the soul’s fittest method of giving vent to its happiness, it were well if we were more like the singing lark, and less like the croaking raven. When the heart is glowing, the lips should not be silent. When God blesses us, we should bless him with all our heart. (The definition for perdition is “a state of eternal punishment and damnation into which a sinful and impenitent person passes after death.)


I must admit that was a long and wordy exposition, but it points our several key points about our absolute faith in God and how to look at things when our days get crammed with earthly happenings that are beyond our control. God is in control and he is our strength. A point of reference; the verse I chose and the one that gave us the background notes might be worded slightly different.

Gethsemane Youth Happenings

This summer has been an interesting way to roll into a new church year. Our youth and their families have endured weeks of summer school to supplement distance learning from last year, days of record heat, and a pandemic that continues to prove how unpredictable it can be.

Our church year begins this month, as does the school year, and we watch eagerly as leaves change colors and fall signaling changing seasons. What we thought and hoped would be a more normal year this year is beginning to look more and more like that of what we remember last year: face masks, social distancing, cancellations.

We've heard repetitively at school board meetings, from our neighbors on Facebook, in news stories, and maybe even from a friend in passing, a quip about "Faith over Fear", what I see when I read these exchanges with Jesus and the multitudes of ailing humans He healed is not fear or faith. Jesus didn't turn away the Canaanite woman, who was probably feeling fear for more than one reason as she approached, and Jesus asked no promise of unrelenting faith before, during or after healing anyone from leprosy, demons, sickness or death. Jesus does not tell us we cannot be fearful and faithful, and to be told we can't is unfair and robs ourselves and our children of their emotions.


Check in with your kiddos about returning to school, church, sports and other activities this fall. How are they feeling? What are their thoughts and reactions to the world going on around them and flying right by them? Check in with yourself too! Are you going back to things because you believe it must be "Faith over Fear!"? Who coined that term anyway? It isn't a Bible verse. If you find that you're returning to things simply because everyone else is, or it's what seems "normal", or what your neighbor on Facebook or a friend in passing made you feel like you had to do - please don't. Casey's therapist would say "let's do a body check-in". If something feels uncomfortable or uneasy it probably isn't what your body actually needs, and that's okay.

I know, personally, the thought of my kiddos going to school is terrifying. I also know, personally, the thought of my kiddos at home with me for another school year is terrifying.

Not returning to two services on September 12th feels like a punch in the gut. Losing even just one of you - or hearing that one of you has lost a friend or a loved one - because we continue to be together every week, and for many hours, would be a bigger punch to the gut.

For now, we can still celebrate a new year with each other, send our youth off with blessed backpacks, and pray that this really is the end of it.

**TIPS FROM THE OREGON SYNOD
DISASTER PREP AND RECOVERY TEAM**

This month's Zoom meeting suggested that we all make a "WHAT IF" list. This is what people need to know if you are suddenly unable to take care of your daily life. FIRST – DON'T PANIC. Just put some thought into what your family/friends need to know.

- * How can they locate needed info?
- * Emergency info and contacts
- * Where are your bank accounts? Passwords, special procedures?
- * Do you have cash available for immediate expenses? If so, where is it?
- * Your medications, schedule for taking them, and where to order/get them
- * Passwords
- * Info on care of your animals
- * Info on care of your special plants
- * Who you know who can keep an eye on your house/apartment
- * Insurance info for health, property, etc.
- * BE SURE THIS INFO IS IN A SECURE PLACE, where your helpers will know to look.
 - * Ask them to record what has been done and what is pending – so you can quickly get back to normal.

Community Outreach

This month we are focusing our efforts toward Wildfire Response and Recognition. Currently (8/24/2021) reported by Oregon.gov, there are currently 55 ACTIVE wildfires burning 126,570 acres in total so far, this year. This year's wildfire season has started in May, months ahead of the projected year. Normally we do not get to experience the true devastation that comes with a wildfire (thankfully), but last year hit real close to home. We are very blessed that last year's fire did not make it's way this far north. We MUST reflect on those experiences of evacuation, dangerous smoke filling the air while darkening the skies, and fires glowing just beyond the horizon. We must remember our experiences because even though those dangers are not in our direct sight, they are in our neighbor's sight.

Lutheran World Relief: School Supplies Needed

After a year off due to Covid, we would like to donate quilts and School Kits this coming fall to Lutheran World Relief. (Personal Health Kits will be assembled and shipped Spring 2022). For many years, Gethsemane has had a wonderful group of people who have made quilts and assembled kits for distribution throughout the world and in our community. Even through the pandemic, I know there was many busy hands still at work making quilts and school bags.

We are able to track our shipments through Lutheran World Relief. In 2020, we had a shipment of our quilts arrive in Zambia; School and Personal Care Kits have arrived in Haiti and Lebanon.

School Kits are distributed in an area with one set of school supplies ready to go in a drawstring backpack-style bag. In the fall, we will assemble these kits with the needed supplies in the bag, pack them in boxes, along with the quilt shipment, and have them delivered to the depot.

We have been blessed with Jan Perkins the past several years sewing the backpack bags. She uses donated heavyweight fabric that is not suitable for the quilts, and has sewn 60 bags for the coming year. Many thanks to Jan for doing this through the years.

September update: *Thank You! Thank You! We had additional supplies turned in for the Lutheran World Relief School Kits. We now have enough supplies for 60 school kits. We are in the process of putting the drawstrings in the backpacks and will assemble the kits in later September for the depot in early October.*

Many thanks too for the bath towels turned in recently. These are being kept until we assemble the Personal Care Kits in the Spring. Thanks too for the monetary contributions to offset the costs of cording, shipping, etc.


We may be not together a lot at this time, but you have been AWESOME at helping us continue our global ministries.
